- Visit the settings in your locality
- Talk about your child's needs and how they can be supported
- Inform the setting of the professionals who are already supporting
- Work together to consider what transition should look like
- Discuss how your child learns and what would help them to achieve their potential

Remember you know your child best and will know what setting is right for them

The setting can access further support and guidance from the Early Years Inclusion and SEND team

What funding is available for my child?

In the United Kingdom, the government provides funding to help families access highquality early education and childcare services. This funding is available for eligible children through three main schemes:

- Up to 15 hours funding for two-year-olds who meet certain criteria.
- Up to 15 hours funding for all three and four-year-old children also known as the Universal Entitlement
- Up to 30 hours funding for three and four-year-old children of working families who meet certain criteria also known as the Extended Entitlement

The funding is available during term-time (38 weeks per year), and you can usually choose when and how to use these hours to suit your needs. Some providers will allow you to 'stretch' the hours over 51 weeks, using fewer hours per week. You will need to speak to your provider to find out what they are able to offer.

When will the new entitlements start?

In March 2023, the government announced new entitlements to support working families which are being introduced in three stages:

Coming Soon

From April 2024 – Up to 15 hours for eligible working families in England with a 2-year-old.

From Sept 2024 - Up to 15 hours for eligible working families in England with a child between 9 and 23 months

From Sept 2025 - Up to 30 hours for eligible working families in England with a child from 9 months old up to school age.





When can my Child take-up their place?

Your child can access a funded place the term after they reach the correct age.

If your child is 2, 3 or 4 years old

A child born between:	If eligible, can access funding from
1st April and 31st August	1st September
1st September and 31st December	1st January
1st January and 31st March	1st April

If your child is under 2 years old

A child born in:	If eligible, can access funding from
December, January, February, March	1st January
April, May, June	1st April
July, August, September, October, November	1st September


You will also need to apply for a code (if required) before your child can start.

The service is based in Cornwall's Multi-agency Early Help Hub and operates a telephone helpline Monday to Friday, 9am – 5pm alongside digital support.



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Family Information Service Statutory Responsibilities

- Establish and maintain services providing information, advice and assistance. The information falls within two key categories:
 - Information about childcare
 - Registered/Non-registered childcare
 - The free entitlement to early years provision
 - Childcare settings suitable for children with SEND
 - Run a brokerage service for parents finding it difficult to access the childcare provision they need
 - Information about other services, facilities or publications which may be of benefit to parents, prospective parents, children or young people.
- Duty to secure sufficient childcare for working parents or parents who are studying or training for employment.
- Every local authority shall open and maintain a register for disabled children within there are.
- To publish education, health, social care and voluntary/community sector provision for children and young people with SEND. This is the Local Offer.





Information, Advice, and Guidance

The Family Information Service is the place to find details of all Ofsted registered childcare providers in Cornwall.

We can provide parents and carers with information on:

- Childminders
- Day nurseries
- Pre-school playgroups
- School nursery units / classes
- Breakfast clubs / after school clubs
- Holiday schemes
- Activities for children, young people and their families
